## Deer Tick Watch

Deer ticks, also known as blacklegged ticks, are just one of thirteen known tick species in Minnesota. They are most common in the east and central areas of the state and are found in hardwood forests and wooded and brushy areas. Deer ticks are potential carriers of **Lyme disease**, human anaplasmosis and babesiosis.

### Risk Timeframe

Primarily risks are from mid-May through mid-July when the smaller nymph stage of the deer tick is feeding. Risk is present, but lower, in early spring and again in the fall (late September-October) when the adult stage of the deer tick is active.

### Deer Tick Bites-Prevention

Check and re-check for ticks when you are in tick-infested areas.

1. When in deer tick habitat, walk in the center of the trail to avoid picking up ticks from grass and brush.
2. Wear light colored clothing so ticks will be more visible.
3. Create a barrier to ticks by tucking pants into socks or boots and tuck long sleeved shirt into pants.
4. Use a repellent containing DEET or permethrin, and carefully follow the directions on the container.
5. After being outdoors in tick habitat, get out of your clothes immediately, do a complete body check, shower and vigorously towel dry. Wash your clothes immediately as to not spread any ticks around your living area. Pets should also be checked for ticks.



### Tick Removal

The risk of getting a tick-borne disease is small if the tick is removed soon after it becomes attached. Deer ticks must remain attached one to two days to transmit Lyme disease, and about one day for the other diseases.

1. Take precautions when in tick habitat, but don't panic if you find a deer tick on you. Not all ticks are infected, and prompt tick removal can prevent illness
2. Use tweezers to grasp the tick close to its mouth.
3. Gently and S-L-O-W-L-Y pull the tick straight outward.
4. To avoid contact with the bacteria, if present, do not squeeze the ticks' body.
5. Wash the area and apply an antiseptic to the bite.
6. Watch for early signs and symptoms of Lyme disease.

# Lyme Disease Basics

Lyme disease is a potentially serious bacterial infection caused by the bite of an infected blacklegged tick (also known as the deer tick or bear tick). The disease affects both humans and animals.

## Transmission

Lyme Disease is one of several tick-borne diseases in North America. In order to get Lyme disease, a person must be bitten by a blacklegged tick (also known as deer tick or bear tick) that is infected with the Lyme disease bacteria.

- o Remember– not all blacklegged ticks are infected with the bacteria, so not all blacklegged ticks transmit disease.
- o The tick must be attached for at least 24-48 hours to transmit the bacteria.
- o The chance of getting Lyme disease increases the longer the tick is attached

## Signs and symptoms

The signs and symptoms of Lyme disease vary among individuals. A person may not have all of these symptoms. People often feel like they have "the flu."

- **Three to 30 days after a blacklegged tick bite, look for:**
  - o A distinctive rash
  - o Fever
  - o Chills
  - o Headache
  - o Muscle and joint pain
  - o Fatigue
- **Days to weeks after onset of illness, one or more of these signs and symptoms may occur:**
  - o Multiple rashes
  - o Facial paralysis on one side of the face
  - o Fever
  - o Stiff neck
  - o Headache
  - o Weakness, numbness or pain in arms or legs
  - o Irregular heart beat
  - o Dizziness, feeling lightheaded, or heart palpitations
  - o Persistent weakness and fatigue
- **Weeks to months after onset of illness, some of these signs or symptoms may appear:**
  - o Joint swelling from arthritis in one or more joints, usually the knees
    - ✦ Arthritis can also have other causes.
    - ✦ Problems with the nervous system
    - ✦ Persistent weakness and fatigue

## Diagnosis

If a person suspects Lyme disease, he or she should contact a doctor immediately.

- o Diagnosis includes:
  - ✦ Physical examination (signs and symptoms, presence of a rash)
  - ✦ History of possible exposure to blacklegged ticks
  - ✦ Blood tests may be performed
  - ✦ A thorough physical examination and history of exposure are required for proper diagnosis and treatment.
  - ✦ Blood tests may be negative within the first 2-3 weeks of illness. A blood test is not required for diagnosis of early Lyme disease when the characteristic rash is present. The blood test is an important part of diagnosis for patients who have been ill for more than one month.
  - ✦ Early recognition of signs and symptoms of Lyme disease is very important for prompt diagnosis and treatment.
  - ✦ Early diagnosis and treatment can reduce the time a person is ill and the severity of the disease.

## Treatment

Here are a few general statements about the treatment of Lyme disease:

The disease is treated with antibiotics. Antibiotics are very effective in killing the bacteria. Treatment is most effective early in the course of Lyme disease. Lyme disease detected later is also treatable with antibiotics, but can cause symptoms that may take longer to go away, even after the antibiotics have killed the Lyme disease bacteria. Most people have a complete resolution of their symptoms after treatment. A small percentage of patients (especially those diagnosed in the later stages of the disease) have persistent complaints after treatment.

*Specific questions about treatment should be discussed with your health care provider.*

## Orange, the Color of Safe Hunters

What better way to be seen than with a blaze orange cap on your head. When you review the hunter incident reports with your students, do you emphasize how many of those incidents could have been prevented had there been an orange cap on the victim.

In addition to safe zones of fire and verification of target, a blaze orange cap can go a long way toward improving visibility and decreasing shooting incidents. Demonstrate to students that safety begins with them and they can assure they are helping themselves by being seen.

Caps are \$10.00 each in orders less than 2 dozen. \$8.00 each in orders of 24 or more. Other than general donations, this is the largest fund raiser for general funds NDHEA has. Secretary's Report by Jean Oster: Minutes from February 13, 2010 Board Meeting were read. No additions or corrections were noted. Motion to approve. MSC: Miller, Rekow.

Treasurer's Report By Clint Baxter: Treasurer Baxter discussed the report as distributed to the group. It was discussed what was paid for the raffle: \$120 for the permit, \$115 for postage of tickets and 10% administration costs. Motion to approve. MSC: Schweigert, Kilwein.

President's Report by Rod O'Clair: 1. Richard Simon has done an excellent job with the new signage. 2. Jerry Rekow is stepping it up in District 11 with mentored hunts. 3. Past President's Report and Legislative Report by Dale Patrick: 1. Congratulations to Charles Vasick as he is now the President of the National Wildlife Federation (NWF). Rod O'Clair is the representative for NDHEA to the NWF. 2. New legislature is coming out. There looks to be new changed to baiting and Chronic Wasting Disease (found south of Bismarck). 3. The land used by the state prison (prison farm) is going up for sale. NDHEA approves that the land be saved for recreational and wildlife purposes. Land acquisition at Oxbow. Please comment on saving public places. .

HE Coordinator's Comments: NDG&F Hunter Education Coordinator, Jon Hanson, discussed a variety of issues. 1. There were 4 successful workshops held around the state. There was an average of 40 instructors at each workshop. There was a lot of positive feedback from the conferences. 2. The new manuals and instructor guides are still being worked on. The final draft will hopefully be in by the end of May so that the new copies can be to the instructors by August or September. 3. Sherry N. has been going around the state and teaching the wildlife habitat curriculum. It typically lasts about an hour. 4. There have been a lot of good and positive comments regarding the web-site study guide [www.hunterexam.com](http://www.hunterexam.com). It has been helping both the instructors and students. 5. Alan Madison products are 30-70% off. These products include Shoot, Don't Shoot and can be purchased at [www.alanmadison.com](http://www.alanmadison.com). 6. Chris Grondal and the Bow Hunter Education will be coordinating with Bow Hunter Education Association (BHEA) to get more instructors certified. 7. IHEA and Remington have an online hunter education instructor course for both new and current instructors. 8. IHEA meeting is in June at Estes Park, CO. 9. The online course is currently being updated. 10. Please remember the ND State Fair July 23-31. If you are available to help, please come up to Minot and enjoy a good time. 11. Wayne Doyle (Kansas HE Coordinator) invited Jon to view their Hunter Education Instructor Academy. Kansas has a 3 day event where all instructors are invited to come and learn. It is held at a 4-H camp. It starts Friday night and goes until Sunday. This year they learned Ethics vs. Esthetics. 12. Pheasants Forever of Valley City will be having a youth trap hunt June 12 in Jamestown. They need youth

Unfinished business:

District Budgets- District budgets were due. The process of the budget will be verified. The purchase of equipment under \$250 is up to the representative. Anything that is over \$250 discuss with the President as they will send the request to the executive board to approve.

Equipment inventories- Reminder: Equipment that has been purchased by the ND Game and Fish Department is property of the ND Game and Fish Department and equipment purchased by the NDHEA is property of the NDHEA. It is not personal property.

Education Committee- Rod O'Clair chose Dale Patrick to be the committee Chair. The job of this committee is to develop the program, recognize weaknesses and help improve the hunter education instructor policy.

Taxes- NDHEA is classified as a Public Charity. Taxes were sent in on March 29, 2010. It was discussed to pay Clint Baxter \$105 for filing the taxes. Motion to approve. MSC: Schweigert, Kilwein.

Mentorship- Chairman Leland Bratlie has not gotten responses from 2 of the companies for help. John and Bill Mitzel have said that they will help with pheasant hunts. He brought up the thought of the true spirit of hunting and mentored hunts. We need to mentor young hunters and keep mentoring them, not just take a bunch of kids out and then not take them out again.

Family Shoots- The Missouri Valley shoot and the request money for supplies for the event in Velva have been approved. Kenmare will have Missouri Valley help with their goose hunt. Devils Lake will have a shoot the last weekend in June and Jamestown will have a shoot August 21, 2010. It was also brought up to whether NDHEA should supply blinds and decoys and where they should be stored.

New Business:

2010 Raffle- Dale Patrick will do the raffle for the rest of this year and next year. There are 820 tickets left. Please have the money and stubs to Dale P. by early July. Ticket selling is going well. Over \$4600 has come in from ticket sales. At the meeting on February 13, 2010 \$400 was approved for the purchase of a new drum. Dale P. was able to purchase a new drum for \$136.33. Great Job!

Memorials- It was brought up to discuss instructors who have passed away have a memorial of some sort. There was a discussion of having the memorial at the North Dakota Game Warden's Museum in the Peace Gardens. Other ideas were: a traveling memorial plaque, awards, recognition in the newsletter etc. It will be put on the web page and will acknowledge service of the deceased. We will be able to keep adding to it if the need arises. If you hear of a death or illness please let Jon and your district representative know. There will be further discussion on this topic at the next meeting. Clayton Thompson made a motion that there should be dedication of service to the organization based upon their commitment and values. Dale Patrick seconds and called question and said that NDHEA personalized sympathy cards should be sent by the President and be tracked by membership and passes unanimously. Dean Hildebrandt memorial has been established in Devils Lake.

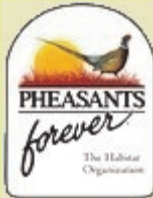
